## Max Potential 2015 Program

Last Term I had the privilege of attending the graduation showcase for the **Max Potential Program**. Congratulations to three of our students for completing the program: Hayley Coster, Caitlin Henderson and Brodie Merrett.

The Max Potential project offers 22 weeks of personal leadership development, including coaching, to young leaders from schools, and the community, to help them maximise their potential during the final years at school, and beyond. It also encourages students to focus on the local community and ways that they can work to improve it.

Thank you also to our community coaches, Senior Constable Sheree Gray and Senior Constable Keli Bastik for their commitment and enthusiasm. Their willingness to input into the lives of our young people is greatly appreciated.

Below is a snippet of the interview from each graduate.

## Brodie Merrett:

As a part of the Max Potential program you are required to undertake a few tasks that are there to bring out your confidence and organisation skills which include a personal expression and community service project.

My community service project that I undertook as a part of my involvement in the program is aimed to service the needs of a target group in the local community. My project, "Physical Physie", is aimed at encouraging younger children especially girls to partake in physical activity and make them aware that they need to stay healthy and active through all stages of life.

To do this I went to a childcare centre in Muswellbrook called "Goodstart Early Learning" where I taught Physical Culture to the specific age group I was aiming it at. I chose to teach this type of dance as I am a volunteer teacher at Muswellbrook Physical Culture and feel that in our local area there are not a lot of sports for children of this age to participate in.

I believe by undertaking this project I am able to make the young girls and their parents at this childcare centre aware of physical culture so they know that there is something in the local community for them and encourage them to keep active and stay healthy through the stage of childhood and later in life.

Through the 22 week Max Potential program I have learnt that to achieve greater things in life you have cross out the negatives that may arise and take a step outside of your comfort zone.

## Hayley Coster:

2015 Year 11 Advisor Tracey Henderson said that "Hayley had clear goals for her future and was more determined than ever to achieve them."

"I agree with that comment. Having the opportunity to do what I wanted to do rather than go off and be silly, I used to do nothing and go nowhere, now I have a direction and an action plan to get there. Also it has helped me to stay on track with school work. I did all my traineeship assessments and got them in on time."

Hayley is currently doing work experience in her 3rd term school holidays at Muswellbrook Hospital as part of her school based training in the 2 year nursing qualifications through New England TAFE at Tamworth where she has to do 2 days a term as part of that training.

Fenney Thompson- Aged Care Unit Manager Muswellbrook Hospital where she is doing her training commented - "Hayley really cares for people, she is passionate about the job and shows that she really enjoys the industry."

Hayley finished off by saying "I am a 3rd generation aboriginal and I want to show that I am equal in the Community and not an indigenous statistic. I want to finish the HSC at School, go to Uni and then get a good job and become a meaningful member of the Community".

## Caitlin Henderson:

2015 Max Potential young adult Caitlyn Henderson is inviting everyone to join in the celebration of the successful application for a \$3000 grant from the Cancer Council to the Muswellbrook Netball Association. This project will allow players and members of the Muswellbrook Netball Association to keep safe from the sun with a new marquee being provided as part of this grant from the Cancer Council.

The presentation will be held on Saturday, November 14 at Karoola Park, Muswellbrook and all are invited.

"I wanted to give something back to my local netball association as they have supported and helped me over the years to grow into the strong and independent person that I am today." Caitlyn said.

This initiative will help to improve the community by working with national organisations to create a supportive local environment for all. The use of this new transportable marquee will help keep the players and officials out of the sun while away at competitions.

"I wanted to utilise different services that not many people knew were available to them, such as grants offered by the Cancer Council offer." Caitlyn said.

The use of this marquee will not only protect the local netball players from the sun but also enable people to live an active and healthy lifestyle by being involved in netball.

#### **GENERAL PERMISSION TO PUBLISH**

Dear Parent/ Caregiver,

I am seeking your permission to publish information about your child for the purposes of sharing his/her experiences with other students, informing the school and broader community about school and student activities and recording student participation in noteworthy projects or community service.

This information may include your child's name, age, class and information collected at school such as photographs, sound and visual recordings of your child, your child's work and expressions of opinion such as in interactive media.

The communications in which your child's information may be published include but are not limited to: Public websites of the Department of Education and Communities including the school website, the Department of Education and Communities intranet (staff only), blogs and wikis.

Department of Education and Communities publications including the school newsletter, annual school magazine and school report, promotional material published in print and electronically including on the Department's websites.

Official Department and school social media accounts on networks such as YouTube, Facebook and Twitter.

Parents should be aware that when information is published on public websites and social media channels, it can be discoverable online for a number of years, if not permanently. Search engines may also cache or retain copies of published information. Published information can also be linked to by third parties.

#### Please NO aerosol sprays

Whilst aerosol deodorants are popular and commonly used, for some people with asthma their use can trigger symptoms and may even lead to an attack.

When used, the liquid contained in these sprays is emitted into the air under high pressure, creating a fine mist which can spread quite a long way. The chemicals and strong smells in the mist, when inhaled, are what can trigger asthma symptoms and a possible attack. Because of the amount of time the spray stays in the air and the distance it can travel, even spraying some distance from the person with asthma can still lead to problems.

For these reasons, we recommend you avoid using aerosol sprays whenever there are other people around - there are usually plenty of good alternatives available.

## Attendance Anecdotes

It's with mixed emotions that I contribute to this newsletter. This has seen some significant gains in attendance across the entire school and should enable students to enhance their lifelong learning.

I do wish to leave a message for all students, as well as their families and it echoes the words that I have tried to promote through the year and that is to strive for your personal best. Improvement is the one thing that makes us that little bit better than we were the day before and it can only be achieved through change ... it doesn't need to be huge! 90% attendance is good, but it still means a day off each fortnight! A small improvement may be a day off each month (for legitimate reasons only) – this will contribute to more learning and essentially an improvement in understanding class concepts or ideas.

I doubt I will ever win a marathon, but I can always focus on beating my best time! I would never have run a marathon without working and being supported by great people at Muswellbrook High School and this has been my mantra for how to approach life.






## HSC Major Work - Industrial Technology Multimedia for 2015

#### **NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM 2015**

School vaccination clinics continue into terms 3 & 4

Muswellbrook High Schools next vaccinations will be: 22<sup>nd</sup> October

#### WHAT IF MY CHILD HAS MISSED A VACCINE

If your child has missed any vaccinations they will be offered any missed doses at the next clinics at their school.

#### WHAT IF MY CHILD HAS NOT RECEIVED ALL VACCINES BEFORE THE END OF 2015.

Any year 7 student with missed doses of vaccine can be caught up in 2016.

**Additionally – any year 8 student** who commenced HPV vaccination while in year 7 and are yet to finish all 3 doses of HPV (and who has not received any from their local doctor) can still receive these at the next clinic at their school.

Don't forget a Record of Vaccination is given to each student for each vaccination. Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.


