Yr. 12 Trials



Deputy Report

It has been very encouraging to read all of the students' Half Yearly reports in readiness for them to be delivered home in the coming weeks. It is clear from these reports that our students are engaging in their learning in a variety of ways and are continuing to extend their learning.

Some students, however, can have issues in completing coursework, assignment work etc. and may be being assisted in this by their teachers. If this assistance has not been effective, then the teachers will be in contact with you (the parent/carer) either via the phone or via the process below.

This process is the same as that for Stage 6 (Year 11 & Year 12). In Stage 4 (Year 7 & 8), a letter of Concern will be sent home to encourage some contact with the school about learning in classrooms. Please take these opportunities to assist your child in meeting deadlines and working with their teachers towards a positive outcome.

In Stage 5 – Year 9 & Year 10

This letter might come as a slight shock, as it is extremely formal in its nature. This letter has been developed by the NSW Board of Studies and Educational Standards, which is the body that oversees the NSW curriculum.

If you receive a letter like this, please contact the teacher or Head Teacher to discuss how your child can complete this task.

There are often some very good reasons why a task was not completed on time. If you would like to apply for Illness / Misadventure, please also contact the Head Teacher of that subject area for assistance.

Unsatisfactory Progress by a Student

In the event of unsatisfactory progress in a RoSA Course by a student:

- The class teacher will notify the Head Teacher regarding the unsatisfactory work, absences, failure to complete competencies, failure to hand in specific research, homework or assignments or classwork.
- If a pattern develops and, after discussion with class teacher, continued failure to follow the course / unsatisfactory progress, diligence to work etc. an Official Warning
 Non Completion of a Stage 5 (Years 9 10) Course ("N" warning letter) will be sent home and the student will be expected to complete the task or activities they have missed. The "N" warning letter serves to indicate a need to rectify the situation in order to maintain RoSA eligibility. The class teacher will also contact the parents by phone to discuss the concerns and means to rectify them.



NEW Bus pass process-Rural & Regional Travel Passes



We wish to inform you that as of the 12 May 2016 bus pass applications will be changing.

From 12 May 2016 the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) online application will be updated, and all SSTS applications must be completed online via:

www.transportnsw.info/school-students

When selecting the forms you will need to ensure you select the travelling outside the Opal network section. Please note that Opal in NOT in our area.

Once this form is completed online the school will then need to verify it and forward it to:

Transport for NSW Parramatta Office Locked Bag 5085 PARRAMATTA NSW 2124

Once the application is back with Transport for NSW endorsed by the school they will send a confirmation email to the appropriate local transport company. The local company will create a bus pass which will be handed out by the driver.

2016 NAIDOC Theme

This year the theme highlights for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, the Dreamtime describes a time when the earth, people and animals were created by our ancestral spiritual beings. They created the rivers, lakes, plants, land formations and living creatures.

Dreaming tracks crisscross Australia and trace the journeys of our ancestral spirits as they created the land, animals and Lores. These dreaming tracks are sometimes called 'Songlines' as they record the travels of these ancestral spirits who 'sung' the land into the life.

These Songlines are recorded in traditional songs, stories, dance and art. They carry significant spiritual and cultural connection to knowledge, customs, ceremony and Lore of many Aboriginal nations and Torres Strait Islander language groups.

Songlines are intricate maps of land, sea and country. They describe travel and trade routes, the location of waterholes and the presence of food. In many cases, Songlines on the earth are mirrored by sky Songlines, which allowed people to navigate vast distances of this nation and its waters.

Ungooroo is proud to announce the launch of a dental service for the Singleton & Muswellbrook area.

Ungooroo Aboriginal Corporation in collaboration with Glencore, the Poche Centre for Indigenous Health at the University of Sydney and Hunter New England Local Health District are proud to launch Ungooroo's new dental service. The dental service is currently available on a fortnightly basis at Ungooroo Aboriginal Corporation for Indigenous children 0 – 18 years from the Singleton and Muswellbrook area. www.ungooroo.com.au

The service has begun with a dental screening program, working together with primary and senior schools from the Upper Hunter Region to build awareness of the service and prioritise children who need urgent dental treatment. The dental screening program involves the dental service coming to the school and conducting a simple dental screening for all Indigenous children who sign a valid consent form which is provided to schools through the service. After the dental screening, a referral form is then sent home to the child's families encouraging follow up treatment at the new dental clinic at Ungooroo. To date, Ungooroo's dental service has worked with Muswellbrook South Public School conducting the dental screening program at the school and follow up treatment for children at Ungoooroo. Many other schools in the region are enthusiastic to participate and booked in for the dental screening program. All schools from the Upper Hunter Region are welcomed to participate in the school dental screening program and all Indigenous children aged 0 - 18 years are welcomed to access the new dental service at Ungooroo Aboriginal Corporation, even if they have not received a school dental screening. The Australian Dental Association recommends that children should get their teeth checked by the dentist by their first birthday to get them familiar with dental services and make sure everything is developing normally.

Currently, the dental service is concentrating on our children, youth and school aged students to address their immediate oral health needs in order to promote oral health and prevent future dental and general health issues.

Ungooroo's dental service is a true example of organisations working in partnership to deliver health services to Indigenous people. Glencore have supported the dental service assisting with the purchase of the dental chair and equipment required for the service.

The Poche Centre for Indigenous Health has provided a Dentist and Oral Health Therapist to provide dental treatment, support and sterilisation services. The Oral Health Unit from Hunter New England Health is supporting the program by supplying the instruments required for dental treatment. The new dental service has been well received by Ungooroo Aboriginal Corporation. Taasha Layer, CEO of Ungooroo Aboriginal Corporation is excited about launching this initiative; she says "it not only addresses a major need in the area but it has created an opportunity of collaboration with businesses working together to assist with 'Closing the Gap' in Indigenous health and addressing oral health issues for our Indigenous youth 18 years and under.'





Graham White from the Poche Centre quoted: "We are excited about our involvement in this partnership. The partnership will provide a real opportunity to make a significant difference to address the oral health needs for Aboriginal children in the region."

Stress and Anxiety in our Senior Students is increasing.

When I work with Year 10, 11 and 12 students I start by asking them two simple questions:

- How do you react when you think of Year 12?
- What message have you received about Year 12?

The answers will not surprise you. Students answer question one with responses such as:

- Fear
- Pressure
- Panic
- Anxiety
- Overwhelmed

It's little wonder that students feel this negatively about the senior years because they tell me the main message they hear about Year 12 is: "It's do or die", "It sets us up for our future".

The Message About Senior School Needs To Change

When our children receive the message that how they perform in the senior years will set them up for their future career, success and prosperity – they are not being told the entire truth - these days there are many different career pathways.

What's more, empowering students to develop the "grit", the determination, the perseverance, the resilience to excel plays a greater role in future success. This is one of the challenges for a parent of a senior student.
