


Upper Hunter Student Leadership Summit- June 22nd

Students are actively involved in cash flow analysis, marketing, IT skills, team building, collaboration, food handling, customer service and a myriad of other hands-on skills.

RYAG WAS A SHEAR DELIGHT FOR TEENS

It was an intense, but all-too-brief introduction to a single sector of agriculture.

But, for 14-year-old Zoe Pritchard and Talia Barnes, a recent Rotary Youth in Agriculture (RYAG) camp focused on the sheep industry was like stepping into an Alladin's Cave of career opportunities.

Housed in dormitory-style accommodation at Walcha Showground over four days, the two Year 9 Muswellbrook High School students joined 32 others from across Northern NSW who visited studs, farms and industry-leading wool and meat facilities to get hands-on experience from experts across almost every aspect of the sector – from wool classing, artificial insemination, ram quality, pasture growing, butchering, shearing, genetic pairing, and much more. The girls can now even tell you the tricks of accurately counting mobs of sheep.

But, the Rotary-run program is as much about learning leadership and teamwork skills, as well as a chance to meet peers who share the same passion for working on the land.

"The camp was great value," Zoe said.

"I have been interested in a career in agriculture and it helped me see just how many jobs there are, not just with sheep but right across the industry.

"I enjoyed the wool classing and loved learning the skills involved in moving the sheep about. I could see myself working in the sheep industry."

Muswellbrook High Agriculture teacher Erin Carter said the RYAG program gave students the chance to explore land-based careers across multiple agriculture sectors in more depth than was possible at school.

"I can show my kids the basics on our school farm, but it's not a working farm," said Carter, who has 70 students studying agriculture in Years 8-12.

"And, besides the sheep industry, they also get a feel for other land-based careers. The girls haven't stopped talking about it since they got back!"

Having Muswellbrook Rotary cover the \$250 cost for each means students who may not otherwise be able to go could have the same experience, she added.

Talia said RYAG gave her a closer look at jobs she had already been considering as possible careers.

"The RYAG week goes into much more detail than you can get at school," she said. "That's great for young adults who have a particular focus on agriculture."

Rotary Club president, Rod Scholes invited Zoe and Talia to address club members on their RYAG experience and pledged the club would again sponsor local students next year.

HOW TO COLLECT BREAD TAGS

collect at your home, work, school etc. and drop your tags off at one of our collection points – see below, or also **host a collection point** where the public can drop off the tags they have collected – see <u>Aussie Bread Tags Host a Collection Point</u>.

Collecting

- Decide where you are going to collect. Apart from collecting your family's tags, consider your school, workplace, sports club or church. Think of asking places where lots of bread and rolls are used such as your local café, child care centre, nursing home, hospital or school canteen,
- Get a container such as a 1kg honey tub, 1kg yoghurt container or a jam jar
- You can make a moneybox type slot in the top. Put a few bread tags inside to give people the idea
- Attach a sign to your container and possibly one on the wall above it see below, or use Aussie Bread Tags Bottle Labels.
- Publicise our program in your organisation by email, Facebook or word of mouth. Join the <u>Aussie Bread Tags</u>
 <u>Collection Info</u> group on our Facebook page to become part of the community.
- When it suits you, drop your accumulated bread tags off at one of our collection points. Check the <u>map</u> (also on our website <u>oxbreadtagsforwheelchairs.org.au</u>) to see if there is one near you, or otherwise contact us to make alternative arrangements. You can also post tags to us at P.O. Box 1164, Kensington Gardens, SA 5068.
