



Hunter Wise Stem Girls Program

Newcastle University Visit

For the past seven weeks a select group of Year 8 students have been participating in the Hunter Wise STEM Program run through the University of Newcastle. Each week they have been collaborating with a mentor from the University and developing a project that will help solve a local issue with STEM based solutions. On Wednesday the 19th of May the students got the opportunity to visit the University of Newcastle and experience a range of engineering programs. The students showed great resilience finding the sodium concentration in a bottle of Gatorade and comparing it to the value on the label, an experiment that is related to the concepts and skills covered in HSC Chemistry.

"We met the civil engineer who designed the bridge near Simpson park that has the mural on it. My favourite experiment was an experiment that made sand feel like liquid using pressure underneath. The day was amazing, and I can't wait to go again." - Jocelyn Dunbar, Year 8 MHS Student.

"When we got there, the first thing we did was a chemistry experiment where we measured the sodium in Gatorade. We then put the samples we made into an instrument [Atomic Absorption Spectrometer] and the fire turned pink and orange. We learnt about smashing rocks and they studied how they break. 


Term 1 - Pen Pal Program

At the end of Term 1 we kicked off our annual pen pal program with our Japanese sister school, Sayama-Seiryo High School. Each year Muswellbrook High School participates in this special initiative, which allows students from both schools to not only make a new friend and learn about someone from another country but it also provides the students with an authentic opportunity to further develop their language skills. All students in Year 7 and our Japanese elective classes from Year 9 to Year 12 have now written their first letter to their Japanese pen pal. We can confirm that our sister school has now received those letters and has assigned each letter to one of their students. The Japanese students are busily writing their letters as you read this article so we can look forward to receiving our first letters early Term 3.







Term 2 - Teru Teru Bōzu (てるてるぼうず)

Year 10 Japanese recently completed a unit of work about weather. So, it seemed perfect timing to learn about a particular Japanese custom called, *teru teru bōzu*.

Teru teru bōzu is a traditional handmade doll, in the form of a ghost, that is made out of white tissue paper or material that Japanese farmers began hanging outside of their window by a string. The name, Teru teru bōzu, can be divided into two words; 'teru' means 'to shine' or 'to be sunny' and 'bōzu' means 'Buddhist monk'. It is a good luck charm, which is supposed to have magical powers to bring good weather and to stop a rainy day. The tradition dates back to the time when emperors and shoguns ruled Japan and a belief existed that a high Buddhist priest could control the rain.

Frequently Asked Questions

Can my child walk home directly from sport?

It is our policy here at Muswellbrook High School that all students return to school for role marking prior to being released for the day at 3.20pm.

If my child needs to leave school during the day?

If you need to collect your child during school hours – You must send a note showing the date, reason and time to the E Block office before roll call to get a partial absence pass.

If my child becomes sick during the day?

If your child becomes sick during the day, they need to advise their teacher and they will be sent to our sick bay – from there we will contact all emergency contacts to have someone come and collect them.

My Son/Daughter will be absent from school for an extended period of time. Can I please have work sent home?

If a medical certificate can be provided, then your child's Year Advisor will coordinate relevant work and/or instructions from his/her teachers. We find that a digital platform is the most efficient mode of communication.

Do I have to pay my school fees all together?

It is preferred that school fees are paid in full but can be paid over the year by the term.

Behaviour code for students

NSW public schools

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive and responsive learning environments for everyone. We teach and model the behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schools students are expected to:

- Respect other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- Follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- Strive for the highest standards in learning
- Respect all members of the school community and show courtesy to all students, teachers and community members
- Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code
- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Respect all property
- Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools
- Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high quality teaching and learning.

Behaviour Code for Students: Actions

Promoting the learning, wellbeing and safety of all students in NSW Public Schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

Respect

- Treat one another with dignity
- Speak and behave courteously
- Cooperate with others
- Develop positive and respectful relationships and think about the effect on relationships before acting
- Value the interests, ability and culture of others
- Dress appropriately by complying with the school uniform or dress code
- Take care with property

Safety

- Model and follow departmental, school and/or class codes of behaviour and conduct
- Negotiate and resolve conflict with empathy
- Take personal responsibility for behaviour and actions
- Care for self and others
- Avoid dangerous behaviour and encourage others to avoid dangerous behaviour

Engagement

- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Arrive at school and class on time
- Be prepared for every lesson
- Actively participate in learning
- Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments. The department provides a policy framework and resources such as Legal Issues Bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context the NSW Government and the Department of Education will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.
